## Pastor's Corner

Rev. Jo Shelnut, Interim Pastor

### *Journeying Together*

Greetings to The Tunbridge Church members and friends, and to the larger community. I was very pleased to be asked to serve as the Interim Minister for the coming year at your church, and I am looking forward to sharing this very special time together. In the next few weeks, the main focus of the church will, naturally, be celebrating the weeks of Lent, Holy Week and our greatest holiday — Easter. At the same time, I will be looking for ways to get to know members, friends and the community better.

To help with that, I plan to spend Friday, Saturday and Sunday in town. I will be at the office in the Parish House on Fridays from 1 to 3. Anytime you see my car (red Forrester with NH plates) out front, feel free to stop in to talk about the church, the town, or just to say hello. I will probably stop in at the Library on either Friday or Saturday as well and people are welcome to look for me there, too.

In the last two issues of the newsletter, Parish Council President Kay Jorgensen described very clearly the differences between Pulpit Supply pastors, Interim Ministers and the future Settled Pastor. The Interim *'walks with'* the congregation and the search committee during the time between settled pastors. There are important opportunities, goals and tasks that the church and Interim will address together. First, we will look back at the church history to better honor and understand the long heritage of The

Tunbridge Church. That might happen at special church gatherings or at smaller get-togethers in people's homes. From there we will work together to discern 'who we are now' and 'what is God calling us to be' in the present time. These aren't busy work tasks or time fillers, but vital steps in figuring out what kind of pastor the church will be searching for and (equally important) what kind of ministry you want to carry out together.

Now is the time for people to start reflecting on how the church is important in their lives and the life of the community. This is the time to begin envisioning the church you want to be in the future. What hopes and aspirations do you have for the congregation and the ministry this church will provide in the next decade and beyond? The search committee and the Interim will help shape the conversations - but *this will be a group endeavor*.

There will be tasks the search committee will handle on their own, which will be explained in detail when we're a bit further down the road. But for now, I'm glad that we are on our way together and that we are starting this journey during one of the most reflective and joyful seasons of the Christian year.

Please join the congregation for the remaining Sundays of Lent and Palm Sunday (March 20) all at 10 a.m., and our Good Friday service at 7:30 p.m. There will be two Easter services on March 27: the Sunrise service at 6:30 a.m. and the Festival service at 10 a.m. In between services, please join church

members for a delicious Easter Breakfast at the Town Hall.

The Parish Council hosted a welcome fellowship after the Feb. 21 service and looks forward to the coming months. As Jo said at her first service, she has a specific job here, in addition to traditional pastoral duties — and that is to help us prepare for calling a permanent (“settled”) pastor.

You will be hearing more about this next phase of the church’s transition, as we form a Pastor Search Committee that will begin the conversations in and out of the church community about what kind of church we are and want to be.

There will be additional opportunities for people to meet Jo and her Labrador Retriever Stella. They will spend long weekends at Kate Caldwell’s, with time at the Parish House office and getting out to know the community better.

Jo was pastor of Quechee Community Church for 12-1/2 years until last May. During the summer she was sabbatical

interim minister at Norwich Congregational Church.

She has a BA in applied music (opera) from Hartt College of Music, University of Hartford, and a master of divinity degree from Andover Newton Theological School. She sings with the Handel Society of Dartmouth College and Cantabile women’s chorus and formerly sang with Bell Canto Singers, Freelance Family Singers and Feminine Tone.

## Christian Education

In the past two months we have celebrated God as coming near, arriving in person as Christ. Now we are learning the power of Jesus' sacrificial love (Lent and Passion Week) as well as His victory over the many ways death and sin hurts us in our lives, in our community, and in the world around us (the Sundays of Easter).

Our curriculum from Seasons of the Spirit is designed particularly to include material for ages 5 and up. As adults, we teachers often benefit from the historical and theological perspectives it offers as well. We provide Sunday School lessons every Sunday when there is not a special event in the service. That means young people will stay through the service for special holidays (like Palm Sunday and Easter), Sundays when the Youth Choir is singing, and Sundays where our congregation celebrates Communion.

This year we are fortunate to have three of us — Ashley, Kathi, and Ben — sharing the privilege and responsibility of teaching Sunday School. We are pleased to have Gail Trostin return to teach on an occasional Sunday. Preparing lessons and applying them with love, patience and fun is always an opportunity to stretch and grow, but we've been psyched to have the benefit of assistants (required under our SafeChurch policy). Joshua Amodeo, Eleanor Frost, and Laura DeCapua have all stepped up to offer terrific help during Sunday School. Thank you!
