But it is the presence of the worshiping community and its individual sense of calling that makes our worship spaces sacred and turns us ordinary folks into a community that we call **The Church**.

It will surprise no one of faith that even in the midst of such sadness, the first two concerns of pastor and church members was "Where will we gather for worship this Sunday?" and "How do we continue to serve the community"? We gather to celebrate God's grace and to be instruments of grace for others. That is the church. Each gathered church, of course, does that in its own individual way. Just as each village and city in Vermont are unique unto themselves, so are our churches. Our current task in the search process is to accurately and enthusiastically describe *this* church and *this* community to potential candidates.

We are about to enter the second half of the pastoral search process. Your Pastor Search Committee (PSC) has been seeking ideas and input from everyone involved in The Tunbridge Church community and the wider community. They are working hard to draft the document which will become your church resume, or **Church Profile**.

As part of the church, you have two tasks to perform before we can enter the final phase of the search process. 1) Attend a congregational meeting to read/hear the Church Profile. You can approve, make comments, suggestions, additions, corrections for the PSC to include before they finalize the Profile. 2) Attend a congregational meeting to vote on a change in the bylaws which pertains to calling a new pastor.

These are the final two ways for church members and friends to participate in the process (until the PSC presents a candidate for the church to vote on!!). Friends of the church are encouraged to attend the meetings and share their ideas.

The new year for the church began on the first Sunday of Advent. We enter

this new year together — a called and caring community. The next few months will be exciting ones in the search process. I will keep this gathered community in my prayers as you walk faithfully together into your future ministry. Please keep your beloved community in your prayers as well.

Parish Council Kay Jorgensen

This column is short because much of the news to be shared is in the columns from Pastor Jo and the Pastor Search Committee. At this writing I still have a foot of snow, the forecast is for freezing rain and January feels like a good time to hunker down.

We can look forward to two social events in February: a potluck supper before the Feb. 5 Annual Meeting and the second annual Just Desserts on Feb. 11. Come to the Town Hall from 7-10 for live musical entertainment, treats, silent auction and prizes to support church painting and capital projects.

Both the Search Committee and Parish Council are meeting this week after the newsletter was written. Because of the timing a few dates may not be decided, so watch for specifics in upcoming Sunday and online announcements. The Search Committee wants a time (probably after a shortened worship service in January) to share highlights of the church profile it is writing. The Council must approve and decide when to present bylaw amendments for a vote (probably at the Annual Meeting).

This is a good time to remind everyone that while church friends are invited to all programs and the Annual Meeting and are welcome to ask questions, members alone have voting privileges on officers, bylaws and, later this year, the most important vote we will have had since 2009 — calling of a new minister. Contact a Parish Council member if you would like to become a member or confirm if you are a member.

## **Pastor Search Committee**

The Pastor Search Committee's work to prepare a church profile before advertising the position of permanent (settled) pastor is drawing to a close. In late January the committee hopes to share its findings with church officers and members before making the last revisions.

The final document, which will be available to prospective candidates in various denominations, will use text and photos to tell candidates about the church and town, including qualities desired in a new minister based on responses from personal meetings and the survey that was mailed. After prospective pastors have replied by a set date the search committee will enter a private and confidential period. No one outside the seven-member committee will be involved and no information will be shared. Committee members alone will read resumes, check references and interact with candidates. An update on where the committee is in that part of its work will be given in the March/April newsletter.

The Search Committee began meeting in June. It produced church history timeline display panels to which members were invited to add their memories and important dates. The panels were first displayed at a July 27 pizza party which kicked off the search.

During the fall members met with dozens of church members and friends to talk about the church now and in the future. In November the committee mailed a survey and membership update to people with past and current member-ship or interest in the church. A brief survey was also sent to groups that use the Parish House or have a relationship with the church.

All during these months the Search Committee provided information about its process through bulletins, the newsletter and at worship services, as well as The Herald, Tunbridge Quarterly and Front Porch Forum. Written questions were solicited and answered in July. During the past month paper and pens were provided in the pews for comments to be left in a box in the vestibule. We appreciate the input we received and serious consideration given to our church's future.

In addition to writing the profile, the Search Committee is recommending bylaw amendments to the Parish Council for presentation to and vote by the members.

The Tunbridge Church Community Food Shelf served 29 families this holiday season. Each family received the food to make a ham dinner with all the fixings for Christmas. The project was organized by the Tunbridge Church Outreach Committee.

The Tunbridge community, both church and townspeople, has always been very generous. The Tunbridge Central School families, staff and teachers had a food drive, while the Student Council wrapped the boxes that the Christmas food packages were gathered into.

The Tunbridge Recreation Committee gave all of the proceeds and food donations from its December breakfast and from a 50-50 raffle — well over \$1,000 — which paid for much of the food purchased. The Clever Clovers 4-H Club from this area made and decorated Christmas cookies for every box.

Many other individuals gave food, monetary donations and gifts for the tables from which families could choose gifts for their families. We also worked with the Toys for Tots organization for the families with children that had signed up. She then went after, bundled together and distributed them to parents.
