Mary Oliver

Mary Oliver's poem reminds us of how simple and easy praying can be. Prayer isn't necessarily a laundry list of desires or a script that needs to be followed strictly. As Oliver suggests, prayer is as much an exercise in listening as in speaking. It's simply time set apart to focus attention on God and the way that we see the divine working in our lives and in our world.

During the summer the demands on our time change. For many the calendar contains a few more blank spaces than it does in the other three seasons as we take a break from our normal routines. This is the perfect time to find a few quiet moments each day to practice the sort of simple, short prayer that Mary Oliver describes.

Parish Council members and I welcome comments and suggestions. You may also use the Suggestion Box (anonymously is fine) in the church foyer. Two grab bars were installed at the Parish House front steps after such a suggestion was made.

# Trustees' Report

Beginning this past week, work has begun on the Parish House to reinforce the floor and replace carrying timbers under the main floor. Ron Caron was expected to begin work on June 23, and the Trustees have budgeted a certain amount of money to cover the repair.

This project will include dismantling the furnace and moving some electric lines, so we are hoping that the work does not find other major problems. But we are happy that this project has begun and the building will be more secure for the many public gatherings in the Parish House.

Food Shelf chair Sue Barnaby reports that contractors have been contacted for estimates and plans for revamping the back room off the Parish House kitchen and improve the entry. This space will be tidier and will house the freezers and other items that are not affected by temperature changes. The cost of these repairs will be supported by the Food Shelf funds.

On a very exciting note, the

Congregational Church interior will get a facelift this summer. Starting in mid-July, repairs to the plaster (severe cracks and bubbles) will be repaired by Sally Fishburn of S.A. Fishburn Inc. of Danville, Vt. We have chosen to hire a professional to prepare the walls for painting in order to have a better and, hopefully, longer lasting fix

Six painting contractors came to look at the church and five gave us quotes that included proof of insurance. Estimates ranged from \$7,000 to \$17,000 to wash, sand, prime and paint the church ceiling, walls and woodwork. They came from Montpelier, Barre and White River Junction.

We have chosen to hire Brent Morrill who lives here in Tunbridge, who gave us the low figure. He has some very reputable references. The total cost of the plaster work and painting will run close to \$10,000.

The church budget does not have enough funds to cover the cost. It is our hope that donations will help reduce the financial burden on the church. Donations earmarked for the painting project may be made to The Tunbridge Church c/o Treasurer T Swayze, 56 Swayze Road.

#### **Christian Education**

It has been a wonderful time of sharing and learning in the Sunday School. We enjoyed consistent attendance of around 6-8 students. The number on any given week was somewhere between 4-12 kindergarten through 8th graders. We piloted a teaching assistant role for older students this year with some success, but found the need for such assistance quite variable. Eleanor Frost, Josh Amodeo and Madison Distel were helpful in the regeneration of a toddler program upstairs during the church service. Details on all of these initiatives and programs continue to evolve as we consider the best ways to serve the needs of our church's and our community's children and families.

Sunday School children decided at the beginning of this school year to designate the offerings that come in on Sundays to the Food Shelf. Each quarter those who are able gather at 10 a.m. on a Saturday to count up the offering money, walk down to the Tunbridge Store, and purchase toiletries to add to the Food Shelf. The children have been able to spend

anywhere from \$50 to \$120, depending on the offering that quarter.

At Christmas, we went down to Welch's to purchase Christmas gifts to put out so families could come and "shop" at the Parish House while receiving their box of food for a Christmas meal. The children find this a very meaningful and exciting activity, and we always take the time to set up whatever they have purchased on the Food Shelf itself. They enjoy purchasing and laying out the items knowing that families from their own community who need them most will have something to smile about at Christmas time and throughout the year.

Children were celebrated on Children's Day in June when the entire church service focused on them. Certificates and "faith stones" were distributed to the children who attend Sunday School, reminding them of all they have learned this year. And this year we presented Euclid Farnham's "Tunbridge Past" pictorial history book to graduating high school seniors from the community.

Though our formal Sunday School program will take a hiatus this summer due to difficulty ensuring coverage, we look forward to several exciting and family-friendly events this summer!

If you have any interest at all in teaching or assisting in the Sunday School Program, please see Ben Wolfe or Deadra Ashton — we need volunteers to keep our program vibrant and to keep our children engaged. Thank you!

The Outreach Committee meets every month to work on ways to support and include members of the church and greater community. Next meeting is Thursday, July 10, at 4 p.m. in the Parish House. Recent projects include the successful collection of personal care supplies for patients at the VA and Bennington Veterans' Home. Thank you to everyone who brought in items. Other on-going projects include the collection of empty prescription bottles, which are reused in underdeveloped countries. Please continue to bring in your containers.

The welcome bag project also continues for new Tunbridge residents, regardless of whether they are purchasing or renting a home. To date, the group has distributed 28 bags, which include bread, jam, pot holders, Tunbridge phone book, and town/church literature. Special thanks to all church members who have delivered them. An Outreach sub-committee is working on the second 5K fun run/walk. The tentative date is October 18th. More details will be available soon. Last year's successful event raised money for renovations to the Food Shelf space. Bids are being collected from contractors to make the back entrance to the Food Shelf/Parish House more accessible.

The committee supported the graduating seniors from Tunbridge on Youth Recognition Day in June, with a copy of Euclid Farnham's "Tunbridge Past."

Work has just begun on a project called Community Connections which will support our older and homebound residents. More details will follow.
