# Pastor's Corner

### Now Is The Time!

Two months have flown by since I began as your Interim in Tunbridge. It has been a busy time, getting to know the church and the town in more detail and putting more faces and names together.

Lent and Easter came pretty early this year, but we were able to meet on top of Strafford Road on Easter Sunday morning without standing in either snow or mud. It was joyous to share the two Easter services with such enthusiastic worshippers. A mighty thanks to the many helping hands that made our celebrations possible; singers and players, dramatic readers and skit presenters, furniture movers and decorators, flower arrangers and breakfast makers, bulletin producers, ushers and greeters, communion set up and servers. Easter was a wonderful way to begin our time together and the hard work and joyful service were greatly appreciated.

*Now is the time* when we begin the Search and Call process in earnest. Step one is accomplished. [#1 Call an Interim Minister to be our Temporary Shepherd and to help guide us thru the process.] Now we move on to step two, which is of paramount importance — and very exciting, too.

#### **#2** Form the Search Committee

For several months, church members and friends have been asked to suggest names of potential members of the Pastor Search Committee. People were encouraged to suggest names of other people they feel would be great on the committee, or to put their own name forward. We are going thru this list of folks, talking with them to gauge their interest in serving and our goal is to have a Search Committee in place by the middle of May. So, if you have a person you wanted to add to the list for consideration, <u>now is the time</u>. Tell me, or a member of Parish Council, or email the AA and let us have that name!

Choosing the right Search Committee is a vital step in the Search/Call process, and complicated. Let me describe some of the considerations that go into the formation of this team of people.

<u>Numbers</u>: The number of people of the team needs to be 'not too few, not too many' but (just like Goldilocks) just right. Ideally it should be 5 or 7 people. Enough to share the work, not so many that it's impossible to get together, or have time to share information and opinions.

<u>Commitment</u>: People chosen for this service will need to have a strong sense of commitment. It requires time, energy, and creativity. It also requires a deep respect for the other team members and a deep love for The Tunbridge Church.

<u>Balance</u>: The Search Committee should represent the congregation demographically. In other words, to reflect the congregation with a balance of women and men, a range of ages, a range of faith views and both long-time members and newer-comers.

Characteristics: In addition to the perfect blend of all of the above, there are a few vital characteristics that are important as well. First is confidentiality. The committee's work is divided between very public and very private. The private information must remain confidential. It can't be shared with buddies or bosses or even family. And because this group will be talking about many issues facing the church —hopes, expectations, strengths, weaknesses they will need to be **respectful listeners**. The skills of having the last word, the loudest voice or always getting one's way...those skills are not helpful on a Search Committee. Telling the truth in love - that one is.

So, <u>now is the time</u> for the Parish Council to choose its Search Committee. We will be speaking with the people who have volunteered to be considered — and a few who have been 'volunteered' by others in the church. We will vote on the membership at our next meeting and present the committee to the church during worship soon after.

Then we'll be onto Step #3 where it <u>will</u> <u>be the time</u> for every friend and member of The Tunbridge Church to participate with the Search Committee to discern what hopes and aspirations they have for The Tunbridge Church and its future ministry.

After a busy fall and winter with almost four months of pulpit supply ministers, the calling of the Rev. Jo Shelnutt as Interim Pastor, the Anything Apple and Just Desserts painting fundraisers, the Annual Meeting and Easter, church life seems to have quieted down.

But don't be deceived — behind the scenes the planning is beginning for a very important church undertaking. You will be hearing much more as we begin the process of self-examination that will lead to the creation of a Tunbridge Church profile. Everyone will be asked to be involved. The final step will be looking for a permanent pastor.

At its May 15 meeting the Parish Council will select the Search Committee members from volunteers and recruits who expressed interest and willingness to take on such an important job. The council will look for diversity in such things as age, sex and length of membership.

Members of this small committee will be the only ones to read pastor applicants' resumes, hear their services and interview them. Church members will vote on the chosen candidate, so if you would like to have a role in the church's future and are not yet a member, you can send or give the Parish Council a note requesting membership through any member.

Church members also choose Parish Council members and approve bylaws. A Special Meeting for bylaws will be held in a few months.

Young people will plan and lead the annual Youth Sunday service on May 8, Mother's Day. The Youth/Children's Day service on June 5 will be followed by a potluck picnic on the Parish House lawn.

Church members had roles in the Tunbridge Civic Club's 64th Annual Show. Club president Elaine Howe was the music director. Pianist Judie Lewis accompanied the chorus and several performers. She and Janet Zug wowed the crowd with their four-handed "Opus I Redone." Marybeth Lang sang her compositions "I'm A Little Rooster" and "Oh Patsy Cline." Choir member Sue Rogers joined Elaine, Janet, Judie and Marybeth in the chorus.

The village church front door was recently repaired. George White fixed the style for a hinge and the lower rail, painted the new wood portions and then rehung and fitted the door.
