A GIFT FOR THE HOLIDAZE

Remember how the day after Thanksgiving used to be the signal to start the mad, mad dash to Christmas? And have you noticed that now, when you go into a store to buy material for that intricately handmade Halloween costume (or grabbing something quick and chintzy off the rack), you can also buy your Thanksgiving tablecloth, plates and decorations *and* your Christmas cards, wrapping paper and stockings?

And I'm talking September, during back-to-school shopping. If your car is big enough and you are strong enough, you can roll it all into one huge seasonal, holiday blob. How special!

Well not really. Nothing unfolds in its due season, with real attention and anticipation and grace. For those of us who have one foot in that mushed-together world and the other in the rhythmic unfolding of the seasons and the church year, there is a great early holy days gift: **ADVENT**

What a gift Advent is to us. This season calls us to be introspective, to be prayerful, mindful of our true selves and mindful of others. At this season, more than any other, that is a gift. It gives us one hour a week to step aside into quiet meditation and preparation. One hour to let go of lists and obligations and let our minds stop spinning and bodies stop running.

We light the Advent candles, we focus on the unfolding story, we become watchful and prepare ourselves for the priceless gift to come. If we take this one practice home with us, gathering one time each day to light the Advent candles, some of that glow, that anticipation may move even deeper into our hearts and minds.

But what can we bring into that other world of which we are all part?

First, realize that much of it is joyful and uplifting. It's not all good "in here" and bad "out there." People need to enjoy the events and get-togethers. But we all know that so much of what comes along with our celebrations is detrimental to our mental, physical and spiritual well-being.

Here is my list of ways to let Advent help us thru the craziness. See what works for you.

Let consumerism and technology help you

- If there is Christmas stuff for sale in September, buy it then and don't go back till New Year's. You'll miss long lines, angry shoppers and loud annoying Christmas songs.
- Shop on line. You can still buy locally and ethically and save gas and lower your carbon footprint! And, again, no canned music.
- Unplug the TV (seriously) for most of November and December. Rent or Roku and Hulu movies to watch when and what you want.

The bonus is you and your family won't be bombarded with hours of advertising.

Meditate in Public

- In that long check-out line, breathe deeply. Silently repeat a prayer or poem. Earplugs can block out all the noise, but it works without too. You just discovered an extra 20 minutes for yourself.
- Take mini-cell phone breaks. Turn off the ringer while waiting in line.

• Find yourself in a traffic jam or at a really long light? This is more found time. Look at the pretty red and green lights — how festive! Turn off the radio, put in a CD (or listen to silence). Use this gift of time to count your blessings. Wow — that light was too short!

Make a list - check it twice

- List one: the things you want to do every year and never find time for. Pick one or two and put them on your calendar.
- List two: the things you "have" to do every year that you don't like. Find a way to eliminate one or two. Substitute something from list one.
- List three: What Christmas giving feels right to you? Mark two dates on your calendar when Christmas is long over on which to give time or money to that same person or organization again.

Love Thy Neighbor

- Your house is overrun and the relatives are driving you crazy. Give everyone a break. Take a plate of goodies to a household of just one or two. Not everyone's house is overrun with family and friends. You'll enjoy the quiet, your neighbor will enjoy the company and the family will survive without you for an hour.
- Remember leaving little bags of gifts and treats on people's door knobs, ringing the bell and running away? Let your children or grandchildren ring and run you drive the getaway car. Giving without getting back will fill the empty places of your hearts.

Here is my wish for us this season: That we will practice Advent together. That we will hear the voices of mystery and prophecy above the din. That we will find balance between our outward and inward lives. That we will come to

Christmastide prepared for joy.

Blessed Advent to you and to your household.

Parish Council

As I thought about the reports in this newsletter two sayings came to mind: "Many hands make light work" and "Put your hands to work and give your hearts to God." I think both apply to our church community and the contributions that volunteers and donors make on behalf of the church and Tunbridge communities – and beyond.

In November the Parish Council will review and approve the 2017 draft budget, which will then be mailed with the annual canvass letter. With the computer purchased last year and its QuickBooks program Treasurer Townsend Swayze and Administrative Assistant Hoyt Bingham are able to keep track of expenses and revenues and make year-to-year comparisons, which is a help in budgeting and analysis throughout the year.

At the recommendation of the Pastor Search Committee the Parish Council voted to extend the Rev. Jo Shelnutt's contract as Interim Pastor for three months – and she accepted. We are pleased that she will be with us through May. The Search Committee's report on this page relates what members will be doing in the next several months as they work on the church profile before advertising the pastor position.

The Council will use some of the memorial funds donated in Arlene Stockwell's name to get a new PA system and speakers for the church sanctuary. We have had too many glitches and it is difficult to hear in the back – as Arlene often noted.

A donor has offered to pay for a new Parish House front walk and steps to replace the deteriorating concrete. Council members opted for steps and railings of pressure treated wood. We hope that work will be done soon.

After two years of fundraising, we plan to paint the Congregational Church building next year. Thanks to recent Anything Apple proceeds and donations we have now raised more

than \$12,500. This amount, plus any additional fundraising, will reduce the need to use endowment funds, since our budget cannot cover such a big project. A Just Desserts evening is scheduled Feb. 11. If that event can repeat this year's success we will have about \$15,000 in hand when we contract with a painter.

Pastor Search Committee

The Pastor Search Committee continues its work on The Tunbridge Church profile. Church history timeline boards have been displayed along the back wall of the church since September. They show 90 years of church history. (We have more, going back to 1760.) The timeline debuted at the July search kickoff pizza party.

All of the colored timeline notes are "history" written by church members and friends. Please use the pads of paper in the back of the church to add additional dates, facts and stories about your relationship with the church. They will be typed and added to the appropriate boards.

The committee is now compiling information for the church profile. Some of it relates to church governance, mission, membership and finances. But a great deal must come from the church community.

As Pastor Jo wrote in the last newsletter, "What do we offer our members, friends and visitors? What are the things we do well, which areas need improvement? Are there things the church is not doing at all? What do you see as our unique strengths and gifts, and what are the challenges?"

We Search Committee members are actively seeking such information in meetings and talks with individuals and small groups. In addition, a letter about the pastor search and membership was recently mailed to people who are members or church attendees, those who used to be members or attendees, and others we consider friends of the

church. That mailing included a survey about expectations for a new minister.

A questionnaire was sent to community groups that have a relationship with the church because they use our facilities (including Making Change, Tunbridge Library, fair directors, farmers market, Neighbors Helping Neighbors) or the church/group supports the other.

After November the committee will share general information about congregational life that we have gathered for the profile. The draft profile will also be available so that we can receive additional input before we produce a finished profile ready for potential pastor candidates, probably in February. We then expect information about the position to be widely dispersed thanks to the various denominations, internet and print advertising.

The Search Committee will propose some bylaws changes for the Parish Council to bring before church members in January. One will give the Pastor Search Committee the duty of recommending a pastor candidate directly to church members. Current bylaws say the search committee recommends a candidate to the Parish Council which can consider additional people for the position.

We welcome comments, concerns and suggestions as we proceed with the pastor search. Please contact any of us.

Volunteers will pack and distribute Thanksgiving bags (sugar-free for diabetics) for local seniors on Nov. 19. Last year 52 bags with home-baked treats, fruit, cheese, crackers, candy and nuts were delivered. Cookies and individually wrapped food items are requested.

On Dec. 16, groups from the church will sing carols at local homes. The next day Christmas boxes will be packed for Food Shelf families. Money donations to help pay for the extras that go in the boxes are welcome.

The Outreach Committee sponsored four Super Senior Luncheons honoring our older Tunbridge citizens and church friends during 2016. Ten of the attendees are over 90 years old. The last luncheon on Oct. 29 had a Halloween theme and featured fall favorites of stew, pumpkin bread and apple crisp.

Usually more than 30 seniors attend each luncheon as well as six to eight workers. Most of this year's lunches were held in the Town Hall to better accommodate the number of participants. And very positive responses have been received.

The 5K Fun Run/Walk, held Oct. 8 under the able leadership of Margaret Rogers, netted the Tunbridge Community Food Shelf \$1,310. Our sincere thanks to all who participated in the event, all the sponsors who provided either monetary support or prizes and the many volunteers who helped make this a success.

A new twist is being planned for the annual decorating of the church for the Advent season. Instead of having the event on a Friday evening, the Outreach Committee has chosen Sunday, Dec. 4,

following the church service, to invite anyone who wishes to stay, or come, to help decorate the church and set up the crèche figures on the Parish House lawn.
