Pastor Search Committee

"Haven't you found a new pastor yet?" That was the headline of our last report which appeared in the July/August 2017 newsletter. As we said then: "This process will be complete not just when *any* candidate shows up, but rather when the *right* person answers the call. We must wait for that person, and trust that we will recognize them when they arrive."

The committee begins the new year without having a settled pastor candidate to present for membership vote. We don't have a candidate because we held to our commitment to wait for the *right* person. We will not recommend someone because we feel pressure to have a body, any body, in the pulpit.

Over seven months we considered profiles from five candidates from three denominations: American Baptist, Reformed Church in America and United Church of Christ. Four of these candidates came to Tunbridge for interviews and we saw two of them lead services.

In late October we found a candidate we thought was right for our church. Another church thought so too, and a couple of weeks after receiving our offer he accepted a position closer to his current residence and family.

The committee remains committed to the search and the belief that we will find the right person. When we started our work we were told it would take at least 18 months. The pool of people wanting to work in church ministry is limited and church vacancies are many. We intend to take some non-traditional measures to help find a pastor, including advertising, using social media and contacting divinity schools.

In the meantime we wait for the right person to answer the call.

When it comes time to vote on accepting the committee's candidate only church members will eligible to participate. In December we mailed the annual canvass letter informing people about the church's work and asking for financial support. We appreciated this note received from out-of-state church friends who responded to the letter: "Wish we could participate more. We always find The Tunbridge Church so welcoming and are impressed with how you define 'community.'"

Thanks to years of fundraising and generous bequests and donations, we begin the year with our properties in good shape with new front steps and walk at the Parish House and painting and rewiring of the Congregational Church. We will again host the annual Just Desserts, Community Yard Sale and Anything Apple community events to support capital projects. A lot of work remains to be done at the Parish House when funds permit.

The Rev. Jo Shelnutt led our worship services during Advent and Christmas. The season brought many pleasures including our choir, directed by Judie Lewis, and guest musicians. More than 110 people attended both the Dec. 24 morning service and the Christmas Eve Candlelight Service of Lessons and Carols.

Janet Zug assembled a large cast, including 13 young children, for "The Christmas Story" pageant presented during the morning service. Adults portrayed the innkeeper, were narrators and helped with costume coordination, prompting and moving the manger to and from the church. Chauffeurs made the rehearsals and pageant possible.
