Pastor Emeritus David Wolfe will lead the Sept. 3 worship service and serve communion in the Tunbridge Village Congregational Church. The communion plates include gluten-free wafers for people who prefer them. Cass Poulos will preach on Sept. 10. The Rev. Claire Bamberg will conduct the Sept. 24 service. talked about painting for a long time and spent three years raising the funds with the support of many people who donated to and attended our events. Treasurer's Report

Thanks to three years of fundraising, plus donations and bequests, the work being done on the Congregational Church building and Parish House has not impacted this year's budget.

The exterior church painting is the biggest undertaking. Fundraising began in 2015. We expect to have more than \$18,000 in hand after the Oct. 7 Anything Apple event. Interior improvements are also planned this fall. The Parish Council voted to buy new pew cushions (see newsletter story), clean the carpet and rewire the church. Arlene Stockwell's bequest provided the new speaker system that was installed in April.

Recent Parish House improvements include painting of the white trim, paid for by a gift designated for capital projects, and a new electric stove, funded by Arlene Stockwell's bequest. A donor paid for the front steps, walk, and removal of the old sidewalk.

Memorial gifts in Arlene Stockwell's name funded a bronze historical plaque for the South Tunbridge Methodist Church and the large Christmas sanctuary wreath and will pay for wreaths for several more years.

While we have been very fortunate with recent donations, there is still work ahead and we will continue to seek additional support for capital projects and events to raise additional funds so we can continue to fund more initiatives.

The church exterior painting is underway and Parish Council attention turns to the sanctuary interior, which was repainted several years ago and needs new pew cushions. Many people have noticed that the gold upholstery has not held up well to stains and that the cushions are so old the inside foam has turned to dust and the material is splitting.

Nancy Chapman and a committee reviewed fabrics and colors and all agreed on one. The cushions can be made and shipped in six to eight weeks.

Church members and friends are invited to help "buy" a seat during September. Donations of any amount are welcome. The total cost with shipping for all of the cushions will be approximately \$6,300 (about \$185 per cushion or \$46 per seat/4 to a cushion).
