Happy new year and best wishes for a year of health, happiness and peace.

Our recent Christmas to New Year's season was special. From Dec. 2 to Jan. 1 our church community shared the season's spirit and celebrated traditions new and old and a life well lived.

It began on Dec. 2 when congregants braved slush and rain to attend the first service of Advent. Many hands made light work as they hung ornaments on the tree and sanctuary wreath and decorated the windowsills during the service. The Christmas tree lights went on before the first Advent candle was lit. After the service the choir and congregants went to sing for Barbara Howe before returning for fellowship at the Parish House.

The spirit of giving was strong the following Sunday when breakfast patrons gave \$960 and food items for the Community Food Shelf in lieu of the normal Recreation Commission Breakfast charge.

On Dec. 16 the annual community caroling took place after the worship service. Then, on Dec. 19, under the leadership of the Rev. Dr. Claire W. Bamberg, the church hosted a Service of Light. This was a time that allowed attendees to observe and honor loss during a season when some feel sadness.

The church hosted two pre-Christmas services on Sunday and Monday. The Dec. 23 morning worship was a firsttime Christmas service of music with five musicians, chorus and many soloists and readings. The Christmas Eve service, which 109 people attended, featured lessons, special music, and the lighting of small beeswax candles as "Morning Star, O Cheering Sight!" was sung.

The year ended with carol singing during the Dec. 30 service. Worship opened with the singing of "Happy Birthday" to Matt Zaroogian followed by his favorite carol.

The new year began on Jan. 1 with friends and family remembering and honoring Barbara Howe at a memorial service held at the church.

All are invited to the Feb. 3 potluck dinner and church Annual Meeting at Town Hall after the worship service. Reports from the treasurer and various committees will be given. Members will vote on the budget, elect Parish Council members and discuss any new business.

Anyone interested in becoming a member and having the right to vote at the Annual Meeting can send a membership request note to the Parish Council. When the Pastor Search Committee has a candidate to recommend for settled pastor, church members alone will be eligible to vote.

No date has been set for the annual February Just Desserts evening because of uncertainties about the Town Hall kitchen renovation. Church members plan to attend the Jan. 8 Selectboard meeting to learn about the project.

None of the three congregations that formed The Tunbridge Church had plumbing and kitchens in their churches. It was town tradition that the town's hall was for community use. In the 1970s the churches' Ladies Aids, which hosted town meeting dinners, chicken suppers and other events, donated a hot water heater, refrigerator and kitchen supplies to the Town Hall. Congregational Church members used the Town Offices' and later the Town Hall's facilities until 1983 when the church put in a bathroom.
